Hi Everyone,

I hope everyone had an enjoyable Christmas break. We had lots of fun at the JWG Holiday Party. As usual there was lots of good food and great hand-made presents, as well as show-and-tell. I enjoyed the chance to get to know some of our new members better, and to meet Rudell's husband Gerald, who joined us as a guest. He is also a spinner and weaver.

The program for January will be "An Overview of Weave Structures" by Linda Schultz. Weave structures are categorized by whether they are simple structures with one warp and weft, or by whether they have compound elements, either more than one warp or weft or more than one weave. We tend to talk about and use individual weave structures, but we don't always look at how they fit together into the bigger picture. I will provide an overview of how the different structures are categorized, as well as examples of most. Then I will talk about Block and Unit weaves, what they are, how they are different and why it matters.

The Center will be open at 9 and anyone who wants to come early for our pre-meeting Q&A session is welcome. If you have a problem you need help with, this is the time to bring it and get advice from other members. Last time, I went over planning a warp with some members. This time we can review threading a loom in preparation for weaving. Please e-mail me if you are interested in this topic or if there is a different topic you would like me to cover.

From Judi Leatherberry: Below are a couple of pictures of my current weaving project. It's being loomed on my 7-foot wide triangle loom; I used Caron brand Simply Soft yarn in Ocean, Oceana, and Off White. It's my first experiment with doing plaid on the triangle loom and I'm loving it! So far, I have about six hours into it (had to take out about two hours of work when I found a mistake in the weaving); it will have a crocheted finish on the long edge, and fringe on the two shorter sides. From Rudell: Below are two scarves in process using an 8-shaft network draft from Alice Schlein's book, "Network Drafting: An Introduction" (Bridgewater Press,1994, p.88). The warp is black 10/2 tencel and the weft is 8/2 tencel in Silver Gray on the left and 10/2 tencel in Moroccan Blue on the right. I wanted a "curvy design" and am looking forward to seeing the end result after they are washed...perhaps for our Jan. meeting!





Around the Internet from Susan:

Goodbye bluetooth, hello antenna clothing – That is the goal of the ElectroScience Lab at the Ohio State University. One project is to develop an antenna hospital gown that can transmit data like heart rates to a health professional's computer. An antenna gown needs to flow, so it must be made of threads that not only conduct electricity, but are soft and washable. The research team is experimenting with high-tech materials like carbon nanotubes and graphene to try to satisfy these requirements. http://tinyurl.com/7mjsgo4

"Hemp for Victory" – say what? All American farmers were required to see this 1942 film to encourage hemp growing as part of the war effort since foreign supplies of jute, sisal and hemp used for ropes and riggings were cut off by the war. Participating farmers and their families were exempt from military service. Wool blanket making mill reopens/rehires – Closed in 2009, the 1865 mill was reopened by two local men who brought the mill back to life, rehiring former workers and rejuvenating the community.
