Around the Web....Wondering how to use those wool thrums??

Researchers from the University of Seville in Spain and the University of Strathclyde in Glasgow have risen to the challenge of producing a building brick that is more sustainable, non-toxic and mechanically stronger than the traditional brick and uses abundant local materials – by adding wool (re-purposed from local textile suppliers) and seaweed to the usual mix. The resulting brick is well-suited to a cold, damp climate.
