Robyn Spady's Workshop "Block Party" Feb 3-5, 2023

We are excited to host Robyn Spady early next year. She is an experienced and acclaimed weaver, author and teacher who is known for her accessible teaching style and eagerness to share her knowledge. Having learned to weave at a very young age, she has been weaving for over 50 years. She completed HGA's Certificate of Excellence in Handweaving (COE-W) in 2004, has authored over 30 articles in Handwoven, Shuttle Spindle & Dyepot and other periodicals and is the founder (in 1916) and editor of Heddlecraft® an on-line magazine published six times a year (quite a bargain at \$19.99).

The workshop JWG selected is "Block Party" which will, through presentation, discussion, and weaving, help us gain a practical understanding of "blocks", the fundamental building blocks of many weave structures and show us how to use them to create new exciting drafts. Robyn encourages participants to use materials they have on hand and offers a choice of 6 drafts: 3 for 4-shafts, 1 for 6-shafts, and 2 for 8-shafts. The drafts will be sent to participants well before the workshop to allow plenty of loom-dressing time!

The first workshop I attended (as a very new weaver) was Robyn's "Extreme Warp Makeover." I was amazed at the breadth and depth of her knowledge, her skill in presenting material, her willingness to happily answer questions and the personal attention she was able to provide to each participant.

WOVEN HUGS REPORT

Hello Everyone,

First of all, of you put your heart into this. I didn't know what to expect when I proposed this project back in the fall of 2019, and you all exceeded even my most optimistic expectations!

By the time I collected the first set of Woven Hugs in June of 2020, the pandemic was in full swing and Gabriel Page 3

House was in full lockdown to visitors. They had to keep thank you, thank you, thank you to everyone who has woven wraps for the Woven Hugs project. I am very touched and grateful that so many their guests safe, as most of them are immunocompromised. This meant that whenever I went to Gabriel House to drop off the Hugs, I was not allowed inside. I put the box or bag by the door and rang a bell, then someone would come out to get them.

When I dropped off the last set of Hugs this summer, I was finally able to go inside and meet with the director and the head of guest services, Valerie Callahan and Lisa Roebuck. They obviously love the Woven Hugs, and couldn't stop talking about how beautiful they are and how much the guests love receiving them.

Whenever a new set of Woven Hugs arrives, new guests (men and women) are given a Hug as a special gift when they check in. The wrap is theirs to use during their stay at Gabriel House, and to take home with them when they leave. Valerie says that most of the guests use their wrap during their stay, because they get cold in the house and in the hospital. Once all the wraps have been given away, they wait until I have a new group to drop off, and then start over again.

Based on the questions some of you have asked, this sounds like an ideal arrangement. The wraps are appreciated and cared for, and the connection feels personal - to the patient, and I hope to you. Now that I

know how the wraps are distributed, I would like to make a card that can be attached to the wrap saying that it is a Woven Hug from the Jacksonville Weavers' Guild, and lists the materials and care instructions. And I would also like to have a space for the name of the weaver and contact information (it's up to you if you want to include that information when you fill out the card). I hope to have these ready for the September meeting.



Pick-Up Stick Basics and Beyond with Sara Goldenberg White- A Review

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I have a confession to make. Pick-up sticks have long confused me. From my first encounter with them during a backstrap weaving class in Oaxaca nearly thirty years ago, to (almost) this day, I just couldn't grasp the process. I could read the most detailed instructions, but then got lost in the weeds once threads were on the loom.

Jane Patrick devotes nearly sixty pages and photos in her classic Weaver's Idea Book to Pick-Up sticks. Still, at the end of each pattern, I was left struggling—Is it heddle neutral, stick up or flat? Heddle up, with stick flat or up? Do I ever use a down shed at all? More often than not, I was left with a tangled mess of warp and no recognizable pattern.

Our Guild's focus group on Rigid Heddle weaving forced me to re-visit my dreaded Pick-up stick as we work through the patterns on Patrick's book. Fortunately, Long Thread Media, the publishers of Handwoven, must have heard of others like me, and timely released the video course, **Pick-Up Stick** *Basics and Beyond with Sara Goldenbera White.*

The instructor is a textile/fiber artist and weaving teacher, who partnered with Jane Patrick on a previous book, Simple Woven Garments (Interweave (May, 2015). Goldenberg White is often featured in Handwoven and Little Looms. This is her first video course, and is available for free viewing for those with All-Access to the Handwoven Library, or purchase \$39.99.

The 114 minute video course is divided into sections that include: How to Read a Draft; Weaving Weft Floats, Warp Floats, and combined; Working with Two Pick-Up Sticks, and How to use a Pick-Up Stick in Conjunction with a Heddle Rod.

The video is expertly produced with clear close-up demonstrations of each technique, followed by a text recap after each section. This avoids having to repeatedly scroll back to the included course handout, which I found quite helpful. Sara demonstrates each Pick-Up pattern both on and off the loom, as well as shows a woven fabric completely finished and fulled. She weaves with Brown Sheep wool, creating stunning garment - worthy fabrics, suitable for a cool weather jacket, should you need something for the 3 weeks of winter we get in NE Florida.

At the end of the video course, I feel more confident and ready to tackle those sixty pages of Jane Patrick's book. I'm nowhere close to the expert Zapotec backstrap weavers, weaving their huipiles using 6 heddle rods and pick-up sticks, but perhaps good enough to weave a towel.

The Other one (R) is a mixture of wool, cotton, and synthetic thick warp along with thinner yellow, red, and blue cotton. Weft is two strands of navy (thick and thin) cotton weft.
