Scholarship Program

The Jacksonville Weaver's Guild Scholarship Program is established to provide financial assistance to active Guild members wanting to expand their knowledge of weaving. This is to include but not limited to traditional weaving workshops, expenses related to demonstrating weaving to a group, or art education. September 2019 marked the beginning of the initial year. Applications will be accepted from September 1, 2019 until January 15, 2020 for the current year and funds awarded on February 1, 2020. Only current members of the Guild are eligible to apply at this time.

Funds for the program will come from the sale of Guild linen yarn, donated fibers and excess equipment donated to the Guild. Other sources of funds will come from the sale of Guild library duplicates, i.e. books and magazines and donations specially designated for the scholarships.

We have already received our first application and are looking forward to more members taking advantage of this unique opportunity.

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The monies collected specifically for the scholarship fund will be used to pay direct expenses incurred while a person furthers their knowledge of weaving; i.e. class and materials fees, travel, meals, lodging. The expectation is the person will present a workshop to pass on the knowledge gained to other Guild members.

Those eligible to apply for scholarships will initially be current active Guild members. The eligibility

may expand to include any person who desires to further their knowledge of weaving (including students); eligibility to be determined at the beginning of each scholarship year. Applications

for the scholarship year will be accepted beginning in September with the funds being awarded February 1 of the next calendar year. Applications should be sent to the Scholarship Chairman between September 1 and January 15 for the scholarship year, any applications submitted after the deadline will be returned to the sender. The individual may submit again beginning the next September.

A committee of three composed of active Guild members including the President, the Scholarship

Chairman and one other Guild member will consider all applications and will decide on which requests will be funded. In the initial year (2019-2020) the amount to be determined by the size of the fund. Once enough funds are accumulated a maximum limit of \$500.00 will be awarded to any individual.

The frequency an individual may apply for a scholarship is once a year and may apply each year until funds are awarded. Once an individual has received a scholarship, they may apply again in four years, i.e. if they are awarded a scholarship February 1, 2020, they may apply again beginning September 2023.

The application process will include both e-mail and mail in applications using the scholarship application form available from the Scholarship committee. The application will include specific information about how the applicant expects to further their knowledge of weaving and what type of program they would present to other Guild members with this new information. Also, to include location of education, date, etc. and a brief statement of what they hope to gain personally from their experience.

This will be an evolving program as the Guild and its members develop educational programs to meet the Guild's purpose to foster the highest standard of excellence in the art of weaving, spinning, basketry, and related arts through an active program of education and study, and to preserve the heritage thereof.



Best Original Screenpla	y Secretary	Provides the written documentation to the decisions of the Guild



November Show and Tell






Here are some photos from our tour of Tessitura Bevilaqua on the Grand Canal in Venice Italy, a Luigi Bevilaqua weaving mill established in 1700, but the family weaving tradition began many centuries before in 1499. They currently have 18 working Jacquard looms & 8 weavers producing remarkable silk velvet fabric.
